

## About the Avery-Copp House

The Avery Copp House was built c. 1800 on the banks of the Thames River in Groton, Connecticut. The house passed from generation to generation of the same family, and is a wonderful time capsule of local history.

The objects and artifacts within tell the story of life in this lovely Groton neighborhood focusing on the early 1900s. The turn of the century brought with it changes both technological and social, and even changes in demographics as new people joined the community with the rise of mass immigration. See how these changes impacted the lives of people in the past and evolved to our lives in the present.

The museum is located on three acres of terraced grounds overlooking the river with beautiful gazebos and a Carriage House that now contains our archive storage facility.
